



Estranged Students Student Money and Accommodation Advice

Students who have lost family contact or whose relationship with their family has broken down can possibly apply for student support as an estranged student. This means that you will be assessed as an independent student and means-tested on your own income rather than your parents' income.

Student funding

If you wish to apply for independent status because you are estranged from your parents, you must provide confirmation from a professional person, outside your family, who knows about your circumstances.

Examples of evidence you could provide are:

- A letter from your social worker, if you have one;
- If you claimed Income Support when you were under 18, a letter from your Jobcentre Plus office showing you were in receipt of this benefit because of your circumstances;
- If your relationship with your parents broke down while you were at school or college, a letter from an advice worker, personal tutor or teacher, confirming your circumstances; or
- If you have visited your doctor because of problems relating to the breakdown of your relationship with your parents, a letter from your doctor to confirm your circumstances.

To qualify for independent status through estrangement, you will need to prove the lack of contact with your parents is permanent.

Student Finance England will normally expect you to have had no contact with your parents for at least 12 months, although this may not apply in exceptional circumstances. You won't be able to apply for independent status just because you don't get on with your parents or because you don't live with them. Similarly, you won't automatically be able to apply for independent status because your parents refuse or don't want to provide details of their income. Buttle UK

Buttle UK provides thousands of grants to young people in the UK, often when there is no other source of help available to them. One particular grant that might be available to estranged young people is the Students and Trainees Programme.

The Student and Trainee Grants programme awards financial support to young people (aged 16-20), who are estranged from their parents to help them attend education. Remember to check the eligibility criteria prior to applying: www.buttleuk.org
